Christianity is based upon the impregnable rock of Holy Scripture. The starting point of all doctrinal discussion must be the Bible. Upon the foundation of the Divine inspiration of the Bible stands or

falls the entire edifice of Christian truth. "If the foundations be destroyed, what

can the righteous do?" (Psalm 11:3). Surrender the dogma of verbal inspiration and you are left like a rudderless ship on a stormy sea, at the mercy of every wind that blows. Deny that the Bible is, without any qualification, the very Word of God, and you are left without any ultimate standard of measurement and without any supreme authority. It is useless to discuss any doctrine taught by the Bible until you are prepared to acknowledge, unreservedly, that the Bible is the final court of appeal. Grant that the Bible is the Divine revelation and communication of God's own mind and will to men, and you have a fixed starting point from which advance can be made into the domain of truth. Grant that the Bible is (in its original manuscripts) inerrant and infallible, and you reach the place where study of its contents is both practicable and profitable. —A.W. Pink ONE SACRIFICE FOR SINS "But this man, after He had offered one sacrifice for sins for ever, sat down on the right hand of God; from henceforth expecting till His enemies be made His footstool. For by one offering He hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified" (Hebrews 10:12-14). The Son of God came into the world to accomplish

the salvation of those the Father gave Him in electing grace before the world began. "Thou shalt call His name Jesus: for He shall save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). In order to carry out this great task, Messiah said, "A body Thou hast prepared me" (Hebrews 10:5). In that body, ordained by the Father and formed by the Holy Spirit, the God-Man showed His qualification to save His people by completely obeying the law of the Lord. Having lived a life of perfection, He offered Himself, body and soul, as the sacrifice to offended justice so that God might be "a just God and a Savior" (Isaiah 45:21). Since the iniquities of His elect were "laid upon Him" (Isaiah 53:6), the law of God found Christ Jesus guilty and executed Him because "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). By His sufferings and death, divine justice was satisfied making it just for them to be forgiven of their sins and declared righteous by God. Because of the cross of Christ, all those for whom He was the Substitute are freed from the law and it's condemning power. Our Lord's dying declaration stands as a lasting memorial of His victorious work: "It is finished" (John 19:30). Reconciliation to God and redemption from the curse of the law were accomplished by the triumphant Savior. Those who were set apart and entrusted to Him in covenant love were "justified by His blood" (Romans 5:9) for He was "delivered for our offenses and raised again for (because of) our justifica-

tion" (Romans 4:25). When it pleases God, Christ will be revealed in these vessels of mercy (Galatians 1:15-16). They will be brought by the Holy Spirit to turn from every false way (repentance) and believe the gospel of grace. Their only plea before God for salvation, forgiveness, righteousness and everlasting life will be the person and work of "the only Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus" (1 Timothy 2:5). —Pastor Jim Byrd --0-I have been often struck with the conduct of blind Bartimaeus. When "many charged him to hold his peace, he cried the more a great deal, Thou Son of David, have mercy on me" (Mark 10:48). Why was this? Truly he had a deep sense of his loss of sight, and by faith he saw Jesus able to restore it. See the consequence of this importunate cry. Did the sun stand still at the word of

Joshua? Behold, at the cry of Bartimaeus the Lord and Creator of all the host of heaven "stood still" (verse 49). Jesus knows the cry of His own Spirit; He will hear it, and help the soul that utters it. "His ears are open to our prayer" (1 Pe-

ter 3:12).
