We certainly must bow in submission to the will of God in all things, but we must do more than that. The servant of a king may or may not approve of the directives of his monarch, but it is his duty to submit and obey. Those of us who know the King of kings, are more than servants, we are the Lord's chosen, redeemed and quickened children. We must not just dutifully acknowledge the providence of God, but we are to trust in, rejoice in and delight ourselves in the Lord and in His purpose regarding us. We are to be fully confident that our God and Savior always has our best interests at heart in all that He does. In Psalm 37, the Psalmist takes us by the hand, as it were, and first of all tells us "Fret not" (verse 1), because being displeased and angry with what the Lord does regarding ourselves or others is sinful and unbecoming a child of God. He then admonishes us to "trust in the LORD" (verse 3), relying solely upon Him in all situations. The Psalmist then proceeds to say "delight thyself in the LORD" (verse 4). Finally, the Psalmist says, "commit thy way unto the LORD" (verse 5) which means roll all of the issues of your life, both spiritual and physical, upon the Lord. The apostle Paul, writing to the Corinthians said, "Christ our Passover is sacrificed for you" (1 Corinthians 5:7). He is speaking of that type of Christ which God established in Egypt in Exodus 12 where a lamb was commanded to be slain and the blood applied to the doorposts of the Hebrews' homes. That Passover lamb was a picture of the Lamb of God, the Lord Jesus Christ and His sacrificial, substitutionary death for God's elect. Thus God says, "And the blood shall be to you for a token upon the houses where ye are: and when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and the plague shall not be upon you to destroy you, when I smite the land of Egypt" (Exodus 12:13). When did God see the blood of Christ His Lamb in relationship to His people? He saw Him in eternity past as "the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world" (Revelation 13:8). He saw Him on the cross in human flesh as His sinless blood poured out from His wounds. He sees Him now as John did in the Revelation as the Lamb that stands and looks as newly slain, His work finished, but fresh (Revelation 5:6). When Christ died, men saw the literal blood of Jesus Christ. When God reveals Christ to and in a sinner by His Spirit through the gospel, that sinner sees the blood of Christ as that which has cleansed them from all sin. God however, has seen it long before we see it. He saw it in that everlasting covenant and had He not seen it then, He could never have seen me in grace! Nor could He have seen Noah as He did before Christ came. "And the LORD said unto Noah, Come thou and all thy house into the ark; for thee have I seen righteous before me in this generation" (Genesis 7:1). —Pastor Gary Shepard

The lovely flower of true faith does not grow naturally in the briar-invested human heart. Such is the wickedness of every man that we could never produce anything so beautiful as this virtue. Faith is, therefore, a gracious gift which God the Holy Spirit gives to undeserving sinners through His regenerating power. "But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name: Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God" (John 1:12-13). True faith looks with disdain upon any other hope of salvation than this, Jesus Christ and Him crucified. Faith that originates with the Lord has this distinction, it trusts Christ whose blood and righteousness merit our complete acceptance with God.
