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"OUT OF THE ANGEL'S HAND"

Revelation 8:4

Thank God for His saving grace to an unworthy people. He chose us unto salvation in Christ Jesus our eternal Surety. The Son of God has redeemed and reconciled us unto God by His blood. The Holy Spirit is the Promise of the Father who has mysteriously and miraculously, through the Word, made us spiritually alive and brought us to trust Christ for salvation. All who believe Him are called the children of God; we are also called saints. Think of that. Those of us who by nature drink iniquity like water, because of the substitutionary sacrifice of Christ, "we are made the righteousness of God in Him." Yet, we are still sinners as Paul attested in 1 Timothy 1:15. He declared that Christ came to save sinners, "of whom I am chief." He did not say, I used to be the chief of sinners, but "I am chief." Being on the one hand saints in Christ and on the other hand a sinful people, the good that we seek to do - our worship and service to the Lord - all of it is contaminated by sin. Prayer is a good thing, reading the Word of God is a good thing and both public and private worship are good things. Listening to the gospel is a good thing, seeking the glory of God is a good thing, but none of us can ever do any of those, or anything else, in a perfect way and it is for certain that no imperfect deed can ever be received by the holy God who demands perfection.

These things being true, how can our works ever be accepted by God since they have the blight and the stench of sin upon them? They come forth from vessels of mercy made clean by the blood of Christ, but we are still vile in our flesh. Thank God, "we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous" (1 John 2:1). In our text, the prayers of the saints go up to the heavenly throne, but they "ascended up before God OUT OF THE ANGEL'S HAND." The angel is none other than the Angel of the Covenant, the Lord Jesus Christ. Every act of worship and every work for God must go THROUGH HIM who makes them acceptable to the Father by the merits of His person and His sacrifice. We are always in need of our Great High Priest and Mediator. His death was a sweet savour unto God. Christ bathes the deeds we do for God in that sweet savor, His sacrifice, and then presents them with His nail-scarred hands to the Father, and the Father receives both the doer and the deeds that are done, FOR CHRIST'S SAKE. Did not our Lord say, "no man cometh to the Father [for anything!] but by me" (John 14:6)? No wonder the writer of Hebrews said of Christ our Altar, "BY HIM therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips giving thanks to His name" (13:15). —Pastor Jim Byrd
