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_____O_____ JEHOVAH-JIREH

"And Abraham called the name of that place Jehovah-jireh: as it is said to this day, In the mount of the LORD it shall be seen" (Genesis 22:14). By divine commandment, Abraham took his beloved son Isaac up to Mount Moriah to offer him as a burnt offering to the Lord. When the old patriarch raised the sacrificial knife to slay his son, the Lord stopped him and ordered a ram to die in Isaac's place. Isaac was a type of our Savior in many ways, but when he was released, the typology changed. The ram caught in the thicket became the type of Christ and Isaac became a picture of those for whom the Savior laid down His life. Abraham was told "Lay not thine hand upon the lad, neither do thou anything unto him" (verse 12), for the ram would die in the stead of Isaac. It could not be that the animal would be sacrificed and Isaac too. Do you not see an instructive illustration in this? Those for whom Jesus died are set free because He was their Substitute. It cannot be that the Son of God would die in the place of His people and then His people die too. No doubt this was when, as the Savior said, "Abraham rejoiced to see my day: and he saw it, and was glad" (John 8:56). It was on this occasion that Abraham realized, more clearly than ever, deliverance by substitution. As a lasting monument of the kindness of God, Abraham gave to that place a special title, "Jehovah-jireh." This name means four things.

1. Jehovah will see. God will always see the substitutionary death of His Son on the behalf of guilty sinners and be satisfied with all that His Son suffered. God perpetually sees the blood and, as He declared, *"When I see the blood, I will pass over you"* (Exodus 12:13).

2. Jehovah will provide, or Jehovah has provided. When Isaac inquired, "Where is the lamb," Abraham answered, "My son, God will provide Himself a lamb for a burnt offering" (verse 8). Some two thousand years later, Abraham's prophecy was fulfilled when God gave His Son to die. "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world" (John 1:29).

3. Jehovah will be seen. "In the mount of the LORD it shall be seen." Divine justice was set forth in the sacrifice of the ram and divine mercy was revealed in the deliverance of Isaac. Even so, the death of the Son of God was the answer to the age-old question, "How can God be just and justify the ungodly?" Through the death of His Son, God magnified His holy character in the punishment of sin and set forth the riches of His grace in the salvation of undeserving sinners.

4. What Jehovah will make one to see. He will make redeemed sinners see the greatness of His wisdom in the substitutionary death of Christ. He will cause His people to realize that in the sacrifice of the Lord Jesus, the holy law of God that demanded death for sin was fully honored. He will make the undeserving to appreciate the vastness of His grace to them through the Lord Jesus Christ. —Pastor Jim Byrd
