**THE CERTAINTY OF TRIBULATIONS**

All of the Lord's people are certain to experience afflictions. After having taught His disciples that troublesome times would come their way, the Master proclaimed: "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). When John saw the chosen, redeemed, called and perfected multitude in heavenly glory, they were identified as those who "came out of great tribulation" (Revelation 7:14). When these troublesome days come your way, rest assured that your brothers and sisters in Christ will, as God enables, remember you before the throne of grace, and that is much appreciated. But there is One, above all others, whose compassion, love and intercession for His brethren is infinitely greater. Christ is that Friend who sticks closer than a brother. Why does the Lord afflict His brethren? Why do these troubles come so often? I cannot give an answer except to say that our beloved Savior afflicts His people, not for His own pleasure, but for our profit. William Cowper, in his great hymn, "God Moves In A Mysterious Way," wrote:

*"Ye fearful saints, fresh courage take;  
The clouds ye so much dread,  
Are big with mercy and shall break in blessings on your head.  
Judge not the Lord by feeble sense,  
But trust Him for His grace;  
Behind a frowning providence,  
He hides a smiling face.  
His purposes will ripen fast,  
Unfolding every hour;  
The bud may have a bitter taste,  
But sweet will be the flower."*

The Psalmist, in the midst of life's trials wrote, "When my spirit was overwhelmed with me, Thou knewest my path" (Psalm 142:3). Our gracious God is always near His children, not as an indifferent spectator to our circumstances, but as One who knows and watches with the loving concern of a Father. Child of God, your trial began when He ordained it; it could not come earlier and will not last longer than He has already determined. Rest assured, "all things work together for good to them who love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28). The Lord always knows what is best for us and has promised that in seasons of distress He will give grace and strength as they are needed. "My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me" (2 Corinthians 12:9). In the midst of affliction, where can a child of God find peace? Hear again what the beloved Redeemer said to His disciples, "In Me ye might have peace." He has promised never to leave nor forsake us; He is our peace having made peace with God by the blood of His cross. It is in Christ alone that sinners saved by grace find peace, even in the midst of tribulation. —Pastor Jim Byrd
