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LOVE OR DOCTRINE?

A church sign downtown reads, "Love can unite us in ways doctrine never will." It is ever the way of man to have little or no regard for the doctrine of God. Doctrine, however, is vital and good; the word simply means teaching or instruction. Are we to forsake the teaching, the instruction of the Bible for the sake of unity and love? Love and unity are wonderful things, but do they outweigh the importance of "the Word of the Lord which liveth and abideth forever" (1 Peter 1:25)? How can there be any unity unless there is solid footing upon which to unite? The only firm foundation that exists is the Word, that is, the doctrine of God. Must we cast aside the Book of God and just love one another? Surely you will agree that the salvation of the soul is vital; well then, consider that there can be no salvation for anyone who does have a high regard and submissive belief of the doctrine of the Lord. "But God be thanked...ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered unto you" (Romans 6:17). Jehovah said, "My doctrine shall drop as the rain, my speech shall distil as the dew, as the small rain upon the tender herb, and as the showers upon the grass" (Deuteronomy 32:2). Are we then to ignore God's speech and relinguish that life-giving, life-supporting spiritual shower of the truth of God in favor of unity? In 1 Timothy 6:1, Paul considered ridicule of the doctrine of God to be as vile as blaspheming the name of God. "Let as many servants as are under the yoke count their own masters worthy of all honour, that the name of God and His doctrine be not blasphemed." The statement on the sign leads the reader to conclude that doctrinal differences should be set aside in the interest of love and unity, but the Word of God asks in Amos 3:3, "Can two walk together except they be agreed?" How can there be any walking together in spiritual communion and unity unless there is an agreement, a mutual love and respect for the doctrine which is of God? Are the teachings of the Lord Jesus to be deserted for the sake of getting along with all religious beliefs? Must we forsake the very truth of God in order to be united with those who deny His truth? Paul warned that the time would come when men would not "endure (put up with) sound (wholesome, free from error) doctrine (instruction)" (2 Timothy 4:3). There cannot possibly be any genuine fellowship between those who belittle doctrine and those who love the doctrine of God (2 Co 6:14-16). And what is the doctrine of God? It is the truth which pertains to the glory of God, the sinfulness of man and the only Savior of sinners, the Lord Jesus Christ. True doctrine is the teaching of salvation by grace alone, through the redemptive work of Christ alone, revealed by the Holy Spirit alone and received by God-given faith alone. Whenever I hear or read of someone who disparages doctrine, the words of 2 John 9-10 come to mind. "Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son. If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed." True faith receives the Word of God because it is, in fact "the doctrine of God our Saviour" (Titus 2:10); remember the words of the Psalmist: "Thou hast magnified Thy Word above all Thy name" (Psalm 138:2). --Pastor Jim Byrd
